Every day, our children get to hear a wonderful piece of literature linked to the topic that they are learning. This term, the teachers have chosen to read...



Author of the Month...

Lisa Thompson





Lisa Thompson is a children's novelist born in Essex, UK. Her debut novel, The Goldfish Boy, was bought as part of a two-book deal with Scholastic (UK). It was published in the UK in January 2017, where it was a Waterstones Children's Book of the Month and went on to become a bestseller. The US version was published by Scholastic Inc. in February 2017 and was given a starred review by Kirkus Reviews. The Goldfish Boy has been nominated for the Carnegie Medal, The Branford Boase Award and the Waterstones Children's Book Prize.

Lisa's second novel, The Light Jar, was published in the UK in 2018, her third, The Day I Was Erased, in 2019 and her fourth, The Boy Who Fooled the World, in 2020. She has also written a novella, Owen and the Soldier, and contributed a short story to Return to Wonderland, a collection inspired by Alice In Wonderland.

Before becoming a novelist, Lisa worked as a broadcast assistant for BBC Radio 2 and CPL Productions where she got to make tea for lots of famous people. She lives in Suffolk, UK with her family.

Our expectations...

We want every child to not only leave us as a reader, but to have adopted a love of reading. Alongside that, being fluent and having good comprehension skills are key in our children's learning across all areas of the curriculum. Fluency in reading is achieved through regular practice. Therefore, it is important that the pupils read outside of school at least five times a week. Reading can include a range of types of texts and media – not just their reading book. This could be, for example, books at home, newspaper, recipes, instruction manuals, comics, magazines, reading on tablets and Kindles. Your child has a Learning Log for you to record and sign to say that they have read. This is how we check their weekly reading. The expectation is:

- To regularly share books for pleasure with adults at home (book talk) in preschool
- ◊ To read at least 3 times a week and record in Learning Logs in Reception
- \diamond To read at least 5 times a week and record in Learning Logs in KS1 and KS2
